That put Whatever against the winner of the first half of the season, the Pin Pushers (Neal McCoy, Bernie Moreno, Wing Tse and Alex Canada). Once again, it was close until the very end. The teams split the first two games and battled until late in the last game until the Pin Pushers pulled away to claim the league title.

After the championship bowling finished, we adjourned to the upstairs meeting at Country Club Lanes to pass out over \$6,000 in prize money. Here are just a few of the notable awards in the league: Jim Smalling was once again the high average bowler in the league with an average of 202. Dwight Zook claimed the title for Most-Improved bowler by raising his average from 155 last year to 167 this year. Also, George Langford bowled the high handicap game for the year with a rousing 327 game.

Changes are coming to our bowling program. Ever since we moved to Country Club Lanes perhaps 10 years ago, we have bowled at 11am on Wednesdays. That time slot let our bowlers from distant locations miss the morning traffic early on and get home before the afternoon commute buildup got too heavy. With the recent closing of Land Park Bowl, Country Club Lanes and has added more leagues and recreation usage. As a result of this increased pressure for bowling times, Country Club has announced that, starting next year, leagues will have to start at either 9:30am or 12:30pm. Our league has chosen the 12:30 time slot, although it's possible that we can actually start at 12 noon.

April Wine Tasting Adventure - Di Arie's Winery

To understand Di Arie's wines, you need some history of the winemaker. Chaim was an inventor and new food product developer, who spent 35 years preparing himself for the role of winemaker at Di Arie Vineyard & Winery. Born in Istanbul, Turkey, he immigrated to Israel as a teenager. After completing his military service as an officer in a tank division, Chaim studied at the Technion, Israel Institute of Technology and received his Bachelor of Science degree in Chemical Engineering. Soon after, he moved to the United States to continue his education at the University of Illinois where he earned a Masters and a Ph.D. in Food Science with minors in Biochemistry and Chemical Engineering. Chaim then joined Quaker Oats where he co-developed the breakfast Cereal Cap'n Crunch. Then, he moved to California to become Director of New Products at Del Monte Corporation where he created an array of new products including "Pudding Cups", "Gel Cups", "Yogurt Cups", etc. In 1974 Chaim married Elisheva and founded Food Development Corporation, where he developed numerous new products including Hidden Valley Ranch Salad Dressing, Power Bars and Wine Coolers. In 1980, Chaim merged Food Development Corporation with California Brands Flavors, his newly created flavor company. Over the next 18 years Chaim transformed California Brands Flavors into a major West Coast flavor company. In 1998, Chaim and Elisheva sold their flavor company and went on to pursue their life-long dream of creating world class wines. Chaim's wines are highly extracted, soft and elegant – a perfect match to fine cuisine.

After this illustrious career, Chaim was eager for creative liberation from the food industry, so he & Elisheva, his wife/business partner purchased a 209-acre parcel of land between the south and middle forks of the Consumnes River in the Shenandoah Valley of the Sierra Foothills. They planted 42 acres of rolling vineyards. His vineyards are planted with Zinfandel, Primitivo, Syrah, Petit Sirah, Barbera, Sauvignon Blanc, Cabernet Sauvignon, Cabernet Franc, Tempranillo, Grenache, and Touriga Nacionale grapes.

Excellence in winemaking must start with a steadfast dedication to keeping meticulous and sustainable viticulture practices in order to source the finest fruit and make a positive impact on the surroundings. They maintain soil health by composting the pressed grape seeds and skins after fermentation and recycle them back into the soil to enrich it with nitrogen and minerals. Furthermore, their vineyard practices fish and waterways protection with certified "Fish Friendly Farming."

Water conservation is a priority. They water the grapes with a fresh drought-resistant water supply from our 600-foot deep well that taps into a pure mineral rich source of water without impacting the water table or our community. A drip irrigation system is used to conserve water and have implemented an innovative system that uses sensors to monitors the irrigation system for leaks.

Before we started with the tasting session, we were invited to partake in a salami, cheese, crackers, bread and olive oil grown on their estate. Then, Chaim presented us with four different varietals to taste each part of his GST red blend: Grenache, Syrah, Tempranillo, and Touriga Nacionale. Each of these wines is comprised of one main source of grapes. As we moved from wine to wine, he explained where the varietal originated from and the unique characteristics of each varietal.

We then moved to tasting with blended wine (GST). One interesting fact, when you look at the wine labels, they contain the percentage of each type of varietal in the blends. For example: 30 percent Grenache, 25 percent Syrah, 25 percent Tempranillo, and 20 percent Touriga Nacionale.

Chaim proceeded with taking the percentages from each single varietal bottle that we sampled, to make his blended GST. He carefully measured each wine, swirled, then provided us with a sample.

We always learn something new from these sessions and our host is always gracious and informative. After the session ended, several couples purchased a bottle of wine to enjoy with their own picnic lunch on their patio.


